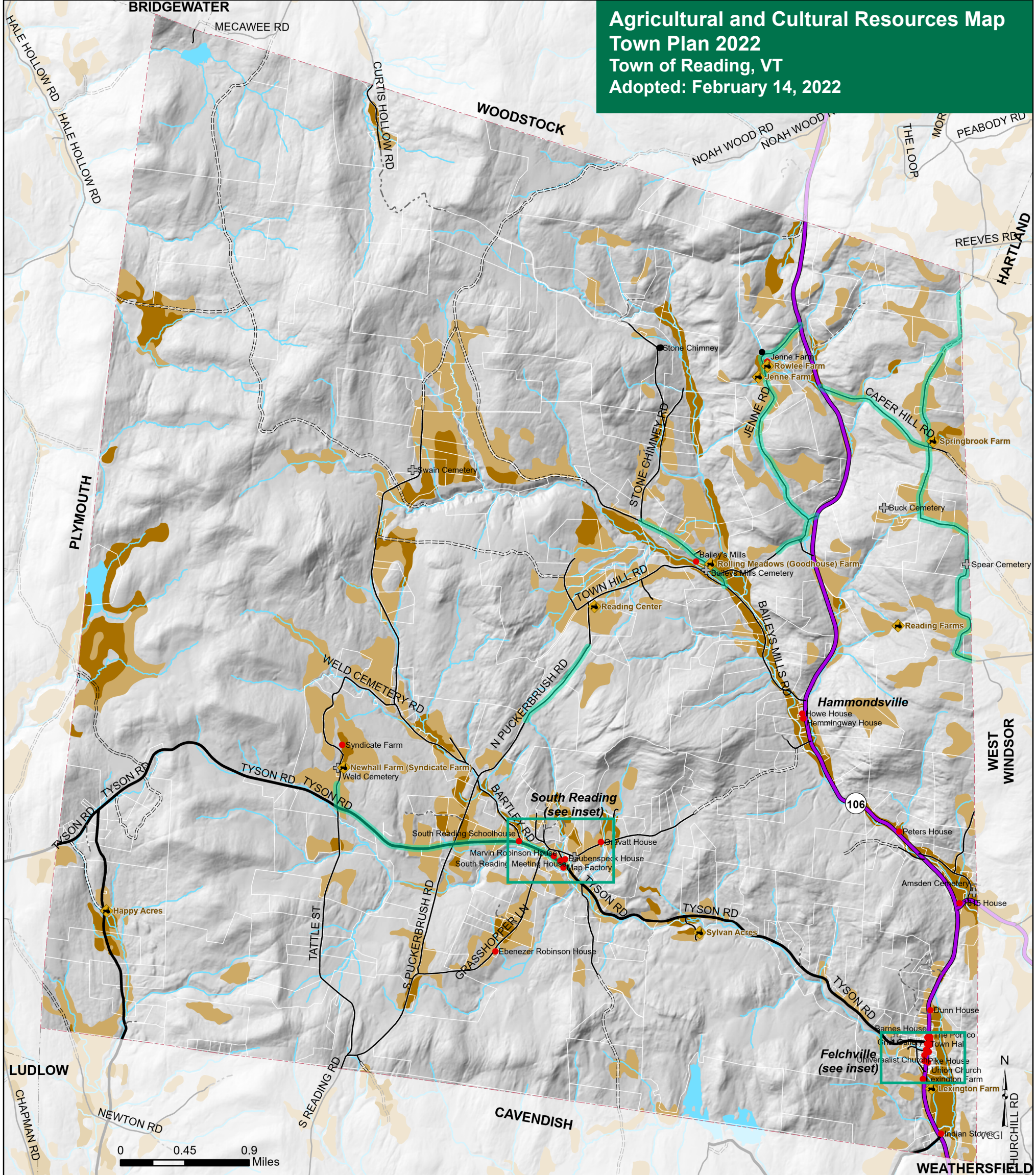

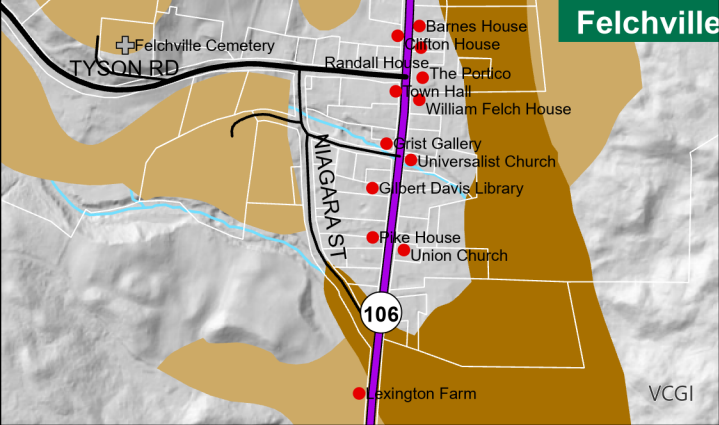
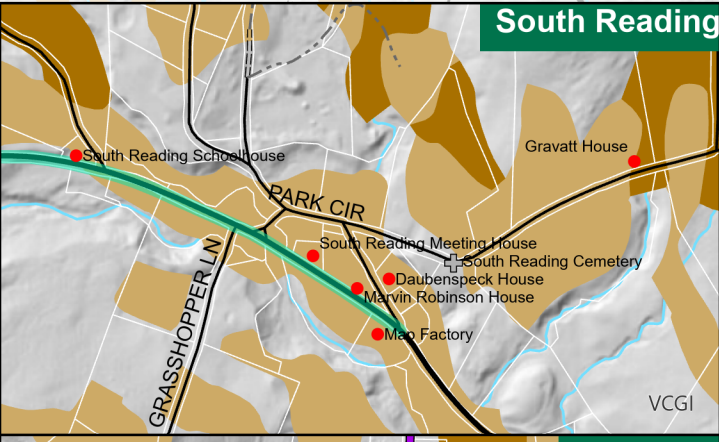

Definitions:
 Historic sites are listed on either the Vermont or National Register of Historic Places. Prime Agricultural Soils have the best combination of physical and chemical characteristics for producing food, feed fiber, forage, and oilseed crops and are also available for these uses. The present land use may be cropland, pasture, forestland, or other land uses, but not urban and built-up or water. Soils of Statewide Importance are those which are of Statewide importance for the production of food, feed, fiber, forage, and oilseed crops. In Vermont, criteria for defining and delineating Statewide Important Farmland was determined by the appropriate state agencies, working with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). The town currently has no soils of Local Importance. Soils of local importance may include land designated for agriculture by local ordinance.
